

# JSAP Venues



Setagaya Campus

The 2006 Spring Meeting of the JSAP will be held, March 22<sup>nd</sup> to 26<sup>th</sup> at Musashi Institute of Technology's Setagaya Campus, Tokyo. The Campus is a short 20-30 minute train ride from Tokyo's commercial hub near Tokyo Station and shopping areas of Ginza in Tokyo and Motomachi in Yokohama City. The Institute's other main facilities are the Faculty of Environmental and Information Studies (<http://www.musashi-tech.ac.jp/03yc-E.html>; Yokohama Campus), Atomic Energy Research Laboratory (<http://www.musashi-tech.ac.jp/Facilities/SC/atomLab.html>; Kawasaki City) and Advanced Research Laboratories (<http://www.musashi-tech.ac.jp/ARL/>; Todoroki, Tokyo).

The Institute was founded in 1929 as the Musashi Senior Engineering School, consisting of the Electrical Engineering, Civil Engineering, and Architectural Engineering departments. In 1949, following revision of the Educational Reform Law, the School was renamed the Musashi Institute of Technology, that currently has a student population consisting of 5,600 undergraduates and 600 graduate (including 180 overseas) students.

The metropolis of Tokyo and the Yokohama bay area, have a wide range of sights and sounds to offer visitors. For culture buffs there is the city of Kamakura, the ancient capital; traditional Japanese theatre at the Kabuki-za in Ginza; the Meiji-jingu Shrine and Asakusa Temple. For sport, there is baseball, J-league soccer, and Sumo. Finally, culinary delights to suit all tastes can be found in the fashionable areas of Aoyama (Tokyo) and Minato-Mirai (Yokohama); or for the early risers sushi in Tsukiji, are but a few choices.
